Sun Safe Policy

BASIC COMMITMENT

We are committed to minimising the risk of harmful exposure to the sun.

Te Whāriki – Wellbeing Mana atua – Children experience an environment where they are kept safe from harm and their health is promoted.

Note: This policy will operate throughout the daylight-saving months, hats and sunscreen will be used outside this time, when temperatures are high.

AIM 1

To protect tamariki and others from skin damage caused by harmful ultraviolet rays of the sun.

This Aim will be achieved as follows:

- 1. Incorporating programmes on Sun Safe behaviour into the curriculum.
- When outside all Tamariki will wear a hat that should protect their face, neck and ears.
- 3. Asking parents to apply sunblock prior to children arriving, and teachers re-applying more sunblock for Tamariki after lunch.
- 4. All staff providing an example to tamariki by wearing a sensible hat, which protects them from harmful rays of the sun.
- 5. Tamariki and Kaiako being encouraged to wear clothing that protects the skin from sunburn.
- 6. Tamariki being encouraged to stay in the shade whenever possible.
- 7. The centre providing shade areas outside.

AIM 2

To have the involvement and cooperation of parents/caregivers/whanau to reinforce Sun Safe practices.

This Aim will be achieved as follows:

- 1. When enrolling their child, parents will be requested to give permission for staff to apply sunscreen products to their child, when necessary, while attending Country Kids.
- 2. At the commencement of daylight-saving time, parents will:
 - Be informed of this policy.
 - Supply own sunscreen product if preferred
 - Supply a hat if their child is in the Piko piko programme
 - Drop off their child with sunscreen already applied
